Assignment -- Periodization Argumentation Brief

Objective: Debate the validity of a particular time period.

Requirements:

- 1. Be prepared to present BOTH SIDES.
- 2. Use specific evidence / examples.
- 3. Provide a counter-plan on the negative side. The affirmative must argue the Status Quo.

Advice:

As you think about periods, consider turning point dates, significant events, the overall essence of the time. Know that events that might fit that theme do happen outside the time, but the argument that the majority happens within can be a strong one.

Process:

- 1. Independently research and prepare your brief. (See attached sample.)
- 2. On the day of the debates, you will be paired off. One pair will be watched by another pair. Then you will switch.
- 3. The Debate: (the whole class will be operating on the same clock so start and finish with everyone else.)
- Flip for sides.
- Affirmative presents arguments for 3 minutes without interruption.
- The negative will cross ex for 2 minutes. Ask and get answered as many good questions as you can in time alloted.
- The Negative present arguments for 3 minutes without interruption.
- The Affirmative will cross ex for 2 minutes. Ask and get answered as many good questions as you can in time alloted.
- There will be one minute of silence for rebuttal preparation.
- The Affirmative will have 1 minute to make a concluding statement.
- The Negative will have 1 minute to make a concluding statement.
- The Observers will write up a mini ballot.
- Switch the Observer pair and go through above again!
- 4. Homework: Revise brief to turn in. It is OK to incorporate some of your partner's ideas, but try mainly to respond to their critiques so your arguments are stronger. You will be turning in both drafts of the brief. Revisions are an important part of the grade.
